A Life Well Lived

On an awesome fall day, November 28, 1923, a baby girl was born to George and Eliza Pope Hayes in Jacksonville, FL. She was the last of eight children in the Hayes household and this beautiful bundle of joy was given the name, "Louise."

At an early age Louise joined and was baptized in Philadelphia Baptist hurch. A graduate of the Stanton High School Class of 1941, she began her collegiate journey at Florida Agricultural & Mechanical University and later transferring to Saint Philip School of Nursing, Medical College of Virginia in Richmond, where she earned her Bachelors of Science in Nursing.

Following Louise's scholastic years, she made the heartfelt decision to serve her country and joined the United States Air Force as a 2nd Lieutenant. Lt. Louise Hayes served proudly during the Korean Conflict from November 1953 to February 1956 as a nurse in the Medical Corps. She was promoted to 1st Lieutenant and became a Nursing Instructor. It was during this time that she was awarded the National Defense Service Medal. Lt. Louise Hayes continued her service of caring while stationed in Germany caring for injured soldiers. After her Honorable Discharge from the Air Force, being an avid traveler, Louise lived in several locations, including Chicago, California and New York. During a brief return to Jacksonville, she was employed at the Brewster School of Nursing as an instructor before returning to New York.

In 1975, she returned to her roots in Jacksonville, rejoined her home church and continued her nursing career until her retirement in 1983. Louise loved serving the Lord and working in her church. She also enjoyed gardening, sewing, making souse, watching baseball and spending time with her family and friends. She helped to organize the Nurse's Guild Ministry where she served for many years. In her latter years, Louise was appointed by the late Rev. Harold LeGree as one of the Mothers of the Church where she served faithfully until her health began to decline. On Monday, July 13, 2020, at the age of 96, the Lord beckoned to Mother Louise Hayes; she answered His call and was awarded her long white robe and starry crown.
