LASTING LEGACY

Mother Frankie Joan Gardner Toler, the daughter of Altimese Corbitt and Luthur Gardner, was born on November 11, 1934, in Jacksonville, Florida. She is the oldest of three children and was raised in a home by her grandmother, Lannie Corbitt, mother, Altimese Black, stepfather, Willie Black, and two brothers; Willie Black, Jr. and Herbert Black, Sr. She and her brothers were raised mainly by their grandmother. Joan accepted Christ at a young age in Mt. Ararat Baptist Church where she was baptized into the Faith. She later moved her membership to Mt. Bethel Missionary Baptist Church which was closer to their residence.

She graduated from old Stanton High School with honors and went on to become a staunch advocate for better educational opportunities, health care and other disparities impacting the black community throughout the rural south. As a young adult, her community activism was often recognized by notable local officials such as former city mayor, Jake Godbold and the Florida Star, which was the newspaper outlet for blacks during that time. Beyond activism, Joan loved attending her home church, reading, traveling, cheering on her favorite football teams (Florida State Seminoles, Dallas Cowboys & Washington Redskins), and listening to Bobby Jones gospel whenever she could. Moreover, she loved a nice Sunday dinner especially if it included fried whiting fish, shrimp, collard greens and a Coke (Do not get her a Diet or Zero Sugar soda)!

Joan married Raymond Toler, and her family eventually grew to five boys and three girls. Her union with Ray Jacobs added more children: three girls and one boy. She became affectionately known as "Big Momma."

Over the years, many local and out-of-state residents would get to know Joan – some even knew her by various nicknames such as: "Prayer Warrior, Face, Jo, Joann, and Granny," but to us, she was our Big Momma. Her resolve and faith were always above reproach. Whenever any of us were in distress or overwhelmed by the troubles of this world, she would comfort us with the Lord's Prayer and favorite quotes such as "Prayer is the key & faith unlocks the door.".

Joan lived to see 4 generations of her offspring birthed into this world. Before her passing, she witnessed her lineage grow to more than 212 direct descendants.

Joan was preceded in death by her father, Luthur Gardner, mother, Altimese Corbitt Black (Willie). paternal grandmother, Lannie Corbitt, brother and sister-in-law, Willie, Jr and Marline Black, daughters, Carolyn Theresa Jackson (Richard), Doris Gordon (Ronald), Raynita Carn (Donald); goddaughter, Barbara Jean; granddaughter, Kisha "Cookie" Farrell; grandsons, George Ronald Davis, Quma Toler, great grands, Shekeyita Standfield, Zion Clark, and nephew, Tyrone Black.
